As some of you know, the Southern Pacific Railroad History Center has entered into a long-term partnership with the Barriger Library of St. Louis, Missouri. As a part of this relationship, the Barriger Library has established a digital Southern Pacific Railroad History Center Collection. The following link: https://dl.mospace.umsystem.edu/umsl/islandora/object/umsl%3A371198 will provide access to the Collection. We are just beginning to post items to the Collection, but as you can see, to date there are photos, a booklet, and a schematic. This is merely the beginning of much more to come. The Barriger Library's system can also accommodate audio and video recordings.

In addition, the St. Louis Mercantile Library, of which the Barriger Library is a part, was founded in 1846, and is the oldest library west of the Mississippi River. Both Libraries are a part of the University of Missouri System, which means that the long term preservation of the History Center's digital is very bright. The History Center is very much aware of its great fortune to have such a home for its digital collection, which will be growing daily.

You can contribute to Southern Pacific's incredible legacy by donating your Southern Pacific related items to the History Center. Documents, photos, drawings, and more can be converted to digital formats and the same can be accomplished for almost any audio or video recordings. The History Center has scanners to convert slides to digital photos and to copy books, brochures, and more. We can also convert maps, drawings, and schematics up 20" wide by 14.5" high. In those instances where we do not have the ability to perform any of this work, we will contract to have it done. What is more, is after scanning and conversion takes place, all materials will find their way to the Library's climate control storage, where they will be curated by specially trained personnel.
